AEBBA Newsletter Editorial

We have come to the end of the bar billiards year and it has again been a great year for bar billiards and the AEBBA would like to congratulate all the winners. The year's highlight was without doubt the World Championships in Jersey, where **Kevin Tunstall** won his record **6th** world title. Hard luck to **Martin Cole**, who had a great run to the final—as many have said already his time will surely come especially with the way he plays the Jersey tables.

Despite being only 5th in the rankings, it has been without doubt Kevin's year. He won 4 national events to put him on 76 in total! In addition to the World's Kevin won the Surrey, Kent and Off the Spot titles in 2019. The top spot in the rankings belongs to Mark Trafford who had a lean year opens wise, winning just the Alternative Rules (but for the first time) before trying to win the Grand Prix to complete his triple crown. He lost his first match but went on to hit big scores to win the event in style. England number 2, Nigel Senior, had a good year winning 3 events—the Oxford Open, the AEBBA 4 pin and finally his home Sussex Open on his 23rd! attempt. Outgoing World Champion Paul Sainsbury made little impact on the opens this year but did win a big one—his 5th All England Singles (puts him 2nd all time behind that man Kevin).

After losing a few finals **Matt Jones** was relieved to get back in the winners circle. He won his home open in Bucks. He also retained the World Pairs title with **Cliff Slade** (the only player not to miss a ball in the final!- potting the 100 hole) Matt now is a new high of 3rd in the rankings. Another home winner this year and a totally new winner was **Jason Neal** who won in Northants and then added the over 50's title later in the year. The 'Tenerife Tornado' **Dave Ingram** showed he can still win despite barely playing by taking the Guernsey Open title. Also there was finally a local league winner of the East Anglian 4 pin event, where **Dave Lilie** beat **Curt Driver** in the final. Speaking of Curt, the England captain steered **England** to another win over **Guernsey** in June, although sadly **Jersey** could not raise a side to play us in Jersey. Curt is now number 4 in the rankings and was again consistent making 4 finals in 2019 but a major singles title eluded him—but he did win the AEBBA pairs with **Mark Brewster** and the Mixed pairs with **Pauline Withey**. Also don't mention to him the county champs but just to add Sussex A were the winners and a star studded Kent team were relegated.

This year the ladies game saw an interruption to the dominance of the top 2 ladies Jean Brackenridge & Pauline Withey. They are still the top 2 in the rankings but neither took a ladies title in 2019 (the first time since 2000 this has happened). Denise Wills won her 2nd British Ladies title. But the other 3 were firsts. First national titles for Ros Appleby (Special Ladies) and Michelle Baden (Ladies Grand Prix). Dawn Jordan became the first Bucks lady to win the Ladies All England Singles in October—after a fair few attempts!

Another great year! The AEBBA would like to wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!

John Burrows

It is sad to report the passing of John Burrows (pictured right) who passed away in June 2019. Obituaries are not usually printed in these AEBBA newsletters, but John was one of the truly greatest players of the game and it seems fitting to pay a tribute to him at this time.



His record in national events is up there with the very, very best. He won the All England singles 3 times plus 1 Grand Prix title. He was also a 4 time winner of the National Off the Spot title before it became the Triangle rules. Add to that 7 more county opens gives a total of 15 national wins. He only lost 2 national finals.

His scoring power was immense, in the 36 opens he played for which there are full records his average leg score was 9,940 (so close to 10k like the Don Bradman 100 test average). This is the highest average recorded of any player in open history.

A period of matches between 1996-98 showed how dominant he could be even in the strongest of eras. He won 3 opens in a row he entered the 1996 Northants, 1997 Oxon and 1997 Berkshire. He then won the 1997 Grand Prix before retaining the Oxon title in 1998. He played 33 matches in this period losing just 2 (both to Keith Sheard, but he did also beat him twice)

He was one of the greats and also a complete gentleman off the table. A true legend of the game.

World Championships @ Merton Hotel, Jersey, 8th/9th/10th Nov 2019

Kevin Tunstall (pictured right on the left) won his record 6th World Championship title in Jersey. Kevin beat teammate Martin Cole, (pictured right on the right) in the final. Martin was put into play first after Kevin won the dice roll. Martin missed early and things looked ominous as Kevin got the balls back, but Kevin also missed early and then there was a battle to try and clear the table from both players. Martin managed this and built a 10k lead at the halfway point. Kevin was not to be denied, however, and made enough with his opening break in leg 2 to take the title.

135 players entered the tournament (5 down on last year) and the first round was again played in groups of 4. There were some exciting groups, and most of the top players progressed, however there was one big casualty. The reigning champion, Paul Sainsbury, was drawn in the opening group and found himself in huge trouble after losing to Janet Burns. This meant he needed to beat Mark Brewster to stay alive, but he lost the dice roll in the decisive leg and was not given a chance by Mark. Another former champion, Trevor Gallienne, struggled as he only won 1 game out of 3 in his group but results went his way to get himself a play off spot.

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Then followed the live draw for the last 64, which, seemed to keep most of the top players apart, for now at least... The pick of the ties (and a repeat of last year's last 64 big match) was two former champions meeting, **Graham Bisson** and **Jim Millward**. Jim reversed last year's result to progress. Into the next round we had a big Jersey v Guernsey clash where **James Jeanne** got the better of **Tre-**

So by the time the field was whittled down to 16, 12 UK mainland, 3 Jersey, and 1 Guernsey players were left in, with 3 past champions present. Some great matches here—Jack Baden took out the 2013 finalist Nigel Senior. James Jeanne recorded a comfortable win over Harry Barbet in an all Jersey clash. James now the only Jerseyman left in as 2 time runner up Nigel Ryall lost to 2 time champ Mark Trafford. The match of the round was between Martin Cole and England captain Curt Driver. Curt chasing 17,360 nearly got there but failed to pull off an ambitious 200 shot with the bar having gone. Onto the quarter finals and James Jeanne kept the Jersey flag flying ending Jack Ba-

. innovating score was enough for Mark Trafford to see off a spirited run by Neil Higgins. And the remaining Guernthe future seyman departed here as Bob Chapple could not overcome Kevin Tunstall. Martin Cole's 17k opener was too much for James Jeanne. Kevin set a tournament high of 19,410 for Mark Trafford and Mark broke down early in his chase.

The World Championship Doubles was retained by Matt Jones & Cliff Slade (pictured left). They beat Curt Driver & Mark Trafford in the final. Matt was the form player of the weekend—just don't ask him what happened in the singles! I am sure this makes Cliff the oldest World Champion in any sport breaking his own record from last year! The plate was won by Alan Brackenridge beating Kyle Ingram. Alan was the player who knocked out Paul Sainsbury in the plate semi final and he complete the Jersey/Guernsey plate double.

Ladies Grand Prix, 24th Nov 2019



Michelle Baden (pictured left) won her first national Ladies title by winning this year's Ladies Grand Prix. This win comes after many years of trying and a few near misses in big competitions. In a repeat of last year's final she beat **Pauline Withey**. The table in the final proved tricky and Michelle built a handy 3k Pauline got the balls back to have one last go but broke down to hand the title over to an emotional and relieved Michelle kept hers to build up a lead of around 7k with 8 minutes to go.

Michelle was the final qualifier and seeded 8th but opened up with wins over top seed **Ros Appleby** and **Jan Bithell** (seeded 4). She lost to **Jenny Florey** (seeded 5) but she had enough score to pip Ros by just over 3k overall. Pauline was seeded 3rd and won her group with 3 wins over **Jean Brackenridge** (seeded 6), **Denise Wills** (seeded 2) and **Mel Standbridge** (seeded 7).

Grand Prix @ Arborfield Club, Reading, 24th Nov 2019

Mark Trafford (pictured right) won the Grand Prix title for the first time. This completes the Triple Crown of events for Mark, having previously won 2 World Championships and 1 All England Singles. He becomes the 6th man to accomplish this feat joining Kevin Tunstall, Keith Sheard, Phil Collins, Paul Sainsbury & Bernie McCluskey. Mark beat Curt Driver in the final. Mark missed early but retrieved the balls to lead by 16k at the break. An early mistake by Curt in leg 2 allowed Mark to ease his way to the title

The top 16 performers on the open circuit this year were seeded and placed into 4 groups—winners progressing to the semi finals. Top seed Kevin Tunstall was rarely troubled in his group winning his 3 games over Martin Smith (seeded 8), Jason Neal (seeded 9) and Jack Baden (seeded 16), In Group B Nigel Senior (seeded 2) took control with wins over Joe Oakley (seeded 15) and Phil Osborne (seeded 10), Mark Trafford (seeded 7) lost a 10k break to lose to Phil but by the time he put 40k plus passed Joe he just needed a win over Nigel to progress. A day's highest break of 23,850 by Mark proved too many for Nigel. Group C was strong and it pitted World Champ finalist Martin Cole (seeded 6) against World Pairs winner Matt Jones (seeded 3), Mark Brewster (seeded 11) and Guernseyman Bob Chapple (seeded 14). The World Champ runner-up continued his fine form to win all 3 of his matches to book his place in the semi finals. The final group ended up in a shoot out between Curt Driver (seeded 4) and Gerry Fitzjohn (seeded 5) as they had both beaten Stuart Mepham (seeded 13) and Stephen Coleman (seeded 12). Gerry will rue missed chances to deny his county team-mate his place in the semi finals as Curt came out on top 12,590-8,040.

In the semis Curt put 19,870 on the board for Kevin to chase—Kevin missed early. A similar story in the other semi where Mark set Martin 16,360. Martin pegging his reply before he really got going.

Over 60's @ Totteridge Club, 20th Oct 2019



The Over 60's title was retained by **Gerry Fitzjohn** (pictured left) after he beat Buck's **Dino Clark** in the final. Gerry was always in control in the final and was 9k in front after leg 1 and he extended that lead to win the match 16,140-1,980.

Only 9 players entered and the competition was run as a straight knockout. Gerry started off with a comfortable win over Brian Dawkins but two tough matches fol lowed to make the final. In the quarter finals he beat Pete Sainsbury, Pete just falling short of the 15,660 (day's highest) break set by Gerry. In the semi Gerry had to chase down this time. Ernie Jordan set him 13,510 and Gerry made 14,560 in reply. Dino's run to the final was also tough. In the quarter's he heat **John Siee** in a close match 10,700-6,000. He had a closer match in the semi final against Sussex's

Ric Bithell but he won that 9,720-6,140.

Under 30's @ Arborfield Club, 24th Nov 2019



Stephen Coleman (pictured left) from Northants won the Under 30's title for the 2nd time adding to his win in 2014. In the final, Stephen faced Jack Baden fresh from his great run to the quarter finals in the World Championships, Jack put himself 5k in front at half-time but Stephen fought back well scoring 14k in the 2nd leg to win 18,420-8,920.

6 players entered and were split into 2 groups with the group winners making the final. Stephen beat

Kyle Ingram (a previous runner-up in this event in 2016) and Cambridge's Lee Mason with a 9k average to win his group. Jack crucially beat reigning champ Joe Oakley in his opening match and followed it up with a win over Jon Gillespie to progress. Stephen also made the day's high break of 10,660 in his first leg of the day.

Upcoming Events in January & February

8th Feb - Oxon Open - The 27th Oxon Open will take in February, at the Berensfield Social Club. Last year Nigel Senior won the title for a record 3rd time beating Curt Driver in the final.
